







The Council is creating a new Local Plan

- A document containing text and maps, setting out how land should be used in the future to achieve economic, environmental and social goals.
- Tailor-made to suit local areas and communities, recognising our aspirations as a nation and our international obligations.
- A means to tackle local issues by maintaining what's good and improving what's bad – and to decide planning applications.
- Based on reliable information, statistics and input from "stakeholders", which includes local people and parish councils.



Local Plan maps must show sites for building new homes

The Government tells us:

As a nation, we need to provide more new homes.

Each local authority must plan to meet the housing needs of its area.

Local studies provide information:

How is the local population changing?

How many new homes do we need in the local area?

Is there enough land available locally; and where exactly is it located?

The Local Plan will include:

A local target for building new homes.

A map of sites for building new homes to meet the local target.

These sites are known as "allocated sites" or "allocations"




Before "allocations" are made, information is published in a SHLAA

- Stands for Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment
- A kind of stock-taking exercise
- A list of sites with information about each site
- People have asked for their sites to be included
- A reservoir of land at the start of the housing supply pipeline



The housing supply pipeline





SHLAAs need to be put in their place

- SHLAAs provide information: they don't make allocations
- All councils must publish a SHLAA
- Many councils in many different situations
- ➡ Bradford: just enough land to meet its needs Their reservoir and glass are about the same size
- Craven: far more land than it needs
 Our reservoir is much bigger than our glass



Q: How many new homes do we need to plan for?

A: About **160** new homes per year in total (outside the national park)
